Recently my daughter made her First Communion. I could bore you to death with stories about how cute she was and how beautiful it was to see all of these innocent children receive our Lord for the first time. One of the great outcomes of her day, though, came through a simple children's book that she received as a gift, called "The Weight of a Mass: A Tale of Faith." Even though it is a child's story, it is one of those tales that is a worthwhile read for people of all ages. I like that it is based on a true story, which makes it even more amazing to me.

The story is about a poor old lady who requested of a baker a slice of bread. Having no money to exchange, she offered instead to attend Mass on his behalf. He scoffed at this idea and to mock her, he wrote "one Mass" on a tiny piece of paper and set it on a balance. On the other side, he threw a piece of bread. To his amazement, the scale did not tip. He continued to pile more and more items on the scale, but nothing could counteract the weight of the Mass. Once he removed the slip of paper, the pile of goods that he had set on the other side came tumbling down.

Thinking that I could open this article with a pithy saying or definition about "balance", I referred to my trusty online dictionary. Webster's definition describes balance as having equilibrium between two objects. My immediate thought was, "Only two objects? Oh, that it would be so easy!" In our lives we are called to balance so many things: prayer, work, family, health, education, etc... Though as adults we might reflect on the simpler days of yore, the truth is that it probably isn't much easier for our students, who work so hard to balance demands of family, school, prayer, relationships, extra-curricular activities, part-time jobs, etc... A common denominator for all of us is a pressure to achieve-to do more, be better, spend more "quality time". It is so difficult for us to find true balance!

"The Weight of a Mass." I have found countless times that when I take the Mass off one side of my scale, everything else comes tumbling down. On the other hand, the better I am at taking time to come before the Lord and share in His tremendous sacrifice, the more my life seems to stay in balance. The last quarter of a school year can be a time of high anxiety, busyness and stress as students prepare for finals, struggle to graduate, fight to pass classes, get stretched by extra-curricular activities, and yearn for time to just relax and take care of themselves. It might be as tempting for our students as it is for me to set God aside to make room for the other demands. Please make sure that you are doing all you can to make Mass a priority in your life and that you make sure your son or daughter is getting to Mass at least every Sunday. Our Lord is there waiting for us with open arms. Let us run to Him and let Him lift the burdens that throw us out of balance. I wish you a holy and blessed end of the year, and a peaceful summer.

2007/08 Teacher's Matching Gift Fund Update

In our April newsletter, Father Meysenburg announced a new and exciting opportunity for our school. A year ago, an anonymous donor offered Pius X \$100,000 if we could raise \$100,000 in donations. The \$200,000 total would then be used for teachers' salaries over the next four years. The matching challenge was made so that tuition costs for the 2007-08 freshmen class would not have to be raised from the previous year's tuition, hence affecting all classes moving forward. We can no longer delay. For every dollar given one will be matched, and

these dollars go directly toward teachers' salaries, in lieu of the money being raised through tuition increases.

Right now we can double our money!

Our goal this year is to find 100 donors to give \$1,000 to help us build this fund to help handle future increases to our

budget for teachers. We realize not everyone can make this \$1,000 commitment, but every dollar helps and we appreciate all of your support. Stimulus Payments

In May, the Treasury Department will begin issuing rebate checks to more than 130 million individuals; this is a result of the Economic Stimulus Act of 2008 signed into law this past February. If you filed a 2007



federal income tax return and have \$3,000 or more of income, you may qualify for a stimulus rebate. Your rebate payment phases out if your income exceeds \$75,000 (\$150,000 if you're married and file a joint return). Rebate payments may be as much as \$600 (\$1,200 if you are married and file a joint return), with an additional \$300 for each qualifying child under the age of 17. What a wonderful opportunity for individuals who are considering donating to Pius X for the Annual Appeal or the Teacher's Matching Gift Fund. Clara Sullivan loved children. Though she and her husband Joe were never able to have children of their own, she chose to leave the students of Pius X High School a legacy with a bequest. This gift of almost \$39,000 will benefit Pius X and its students for many years to come.

Monsignor Dawson, who was a very good friend of Clara's, stopped by my office to share some good stories about her life. Clara was born in 1912 in Lancaster County. As a child, she would ride three miles to school in a cart pulled by two horses.

Joe Sullivan, whom she later married, also attended school with Clara, as his mother was their teacher. Joe would arrive to school early so that he could unhook Clara's horse from her cart, and then he would feed it every day before school and at lunchtime.

When Clara turned eight, her father passed away and her mother sent her to St. Thomas orphanage which was located on south 27th Street. At the orphanage, the Sisters of St. Francis of Perpetual Adoration cared for her. In high school, Clara lived with a family in Lincoln where she helped take care of their three children. She attended the old St. Mary's High School which was located one block north of the current St. Mary's parish.

According to Mae Aksamit, Clara's good friend, "Clara was smart and she did a lot of good." Clara was very generous to many Catholic organizations throughout her lifetime. With this gift, Clara will have donated over \$81,000 to the Pius X Foundation over her lifetime! Clara is a true steward of the gifts God bestowed on her.

Pius X is very grateful to Clara for making a big difference in our school and students' lives. Clara will be lovingly remembered at Pius X with this beautiful gift to the endowment fund. bid run, valet park and help with clean up as well as singing at our Mass before BOLT. We also have tremendous support from all the Pius X High School staff.

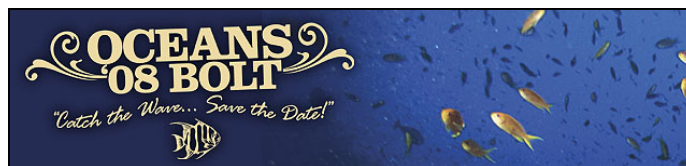

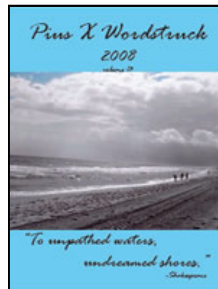

Pius X High School student writers and visual artists have been showcased for the past seven years in the school's literary magazine, WORDSTRUCK. This magazine was first created as a mimeographed class project for students in the senior writing classes. It has since evolved into a professionally printed, award winning magazine (awarded by the Nebraska Council of Teachers of English).

This year it includes works from 52 Pius X students, freshmen-seniors, and has 76 printed pages. The entire process of producing the magazine was accomplished by both semesters of the senior writing class, and all of the work was completed outside of class time, with the exception of the selection process. Over 450 pieces were submitted for review for the publication, and anonymous selections were made by the first semester class. As in the past few years, the open mic time at the end of the formal program was quite popular with some readers coming from the Pius X faculty and even other schools.

Nebraska Capitol Forum

Congratulations to Will Huston, Zach Seier, Sarah McClure, and Marian Hanigan, who represented Pius X at the Nebraska Humanities Council's Capitol Forum here in Lincoln, NE, on Monday, March 31, 2008. They were among more than 90 high school students and 22 teachers from 22 high schools in Nebraska who gathered for the day-long forum to discuss the U.S. role in today's world.

Capitol Forum is a civic education initiative designed to give high school students a voice in public policy. For six months, students studied and deliberated foreign policy issues in the classroom. On March 31, 2008, student representatives from each school engaged in discussion among themselves and with policymakers and other elected officials on such issues as immigration, nuclear weapon proliferation, terrorism, international trade, and the global environment. They deliberated on four distinct options for the future of U.S. foreign policy, culminating in a conversation with members of Nebraska's congressional delegation.

The day began at 8:30 a.m. with a welcome by Governor Dave Heineman in the Warner Chamber. Deliberation on the four futures began at 1:40 p.m. The students' conversation with Representatives Fortenberry, Terry, and Smith then took place at 2:45 p.m.

After the March 31, 2008, forum, the teachers and students returned home to share their experiences with classmates, broadening the impact of Capitol Forum to more than 1,200 students statewide. These classes completed a ballot describing their view of America's future role in the world. 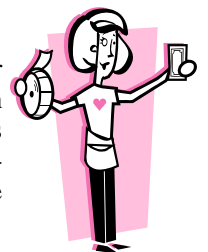

Dress Requirements For 2008-09 Yearbook



All students, grades **9-12**, must be dressed following these guidelines for the **2008-09 class pictures** sections of the Thunderer Yearbook:

Girls: Tops or dresses that reach the neckline with no obvious cleavage and cover the shoulders; no words or symbols on clothing. Pictures with facial or body piercing, tattoos or hats are not acceptable.

Boys: Suits or sport coats with long neckties or bowties; sport shirt (polo shirts) with top button open; turtlenecks, v-neck sweaters with shirts or crew neck sweaters or shirts. No words or symbols on clothing. Pictures with facial hair, any piercing, tattoos or hats are not acceptable.

Senior Photograph Submission Policy

Specifications:

- 1). **Size and Shape:** A vertical print, of approximately 2" X 3", or a standard wallet size is required.
- 2). **Background:** The background may be indoor or outdoor but should be simple and devoid of any writing or symbols that may detract from the student's face.
- 3). **Tone:** Faces must stand out from the background and have sufficient contrast to avoid a flat, faint, or shallow appearance.
- 4). **Poses:** Students shall be conservatively posed, preferably full front or slightly to the side. Avoid extreme angles, profile views, or gazing into space.
- 5). **Clothing:** Please review the dress requirements listed above, and follow them closely. Your photo will not be included if these requirements are not met.



Procedures:

- 1). **Deadline:** The deadline for Yearbook/Senior Video photo submission will be **Tuesday, November 25, 2008**.
- 2). **Schedule Photos Early:** Seniors are urged to have their pictures taken during the summer and early fall months to allow enough time to meet this deadline.
- 3). **Follow The Requirements:** If an acceptable photo is not submitted by the deadline, the Pius X Yearbook Advisor will review the photo taken by the school photo company for ID purposes and use it instead. If a photo was not taken or is inappropriate, the student will not be pictured in the senior mugs pages.

Mandatory 9th Grade Retreat

Freshman Retreat

All those entering their 9th grade year in the 2008/09 school year **must** attend the 9th Grade Retreat to be held August 17th and 18th, 2008, at Pius X. The retreat is from 7 p.m. - 10 p.m. on Sunday, August 17, 2008; and from 8 a.m. - 12 noon on Monday, August 18, 2008. Students who miss this retreat will need to attend another retreat during the school year.

Sunday night is the orientation part of the retreat which includes physical activities and ice breakers, so students should **dress modestly and appropriately**. **There will NOT be Mass on Sunday night**. Monday is the reflective part of the retreat which includes speakers, group discussions, and a holy hour with the opportunity for Confession.

On Sunday, students with last names beginning with A – I should bring a ½ dozen cookies or desserts, those with last names beginning with J – R should bring fruits or vegetables for a ½ dozen people, and students with last names S – Z should bring a box or a bag of chips, crackers, or granola bars. Drinks are provided. On Monday, students should eat breakfast before they come to the retreat.

2008/2009 Physical Examination Forms

Due to privacy and HIPAA issues, the NSAA's Sports Medicine Advisory Committee has recommended that schools utilize a different form and different procedures than have previously been used for activities' physical examinations. Medical professionals on the NSAA Sports Medicine Advisory Committee expressed concerns that collections of and access to confidential student medical information by schools would likely constitute an infringement of privacy and HIPAA guidelines.



In the past, the two-part NSAA pre-participation physical form included (1) a page of student medical history, and (2) a page with the actual examination report. Once the physical examination was completed, both the medical history and examination report were filed with the student's high school—a practice that has been challenged as infringing on privacy and HIPAA regulations.

A new three-part form includes (1) **a History Form**; (2) the actual **Physical Examination Form**; and (3) the **Clearance Form**. To meet privacy and HIPAA requirements, the examining physician will retain on file the History Form and the Physical Examination Form, with only the Clearance Form being returned to the student to be placed on file at the school.

The NSAA requires that each athlete complete a physical examination prior to attending tryouts. These forms for the 2008/2009 school year are available in Pius X's main office, and must be dated on or after May 1, 2008.

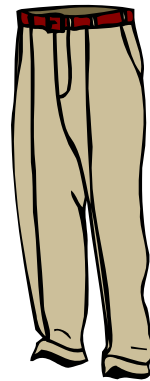

Prescription Drug Abuse



The White House Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) has launched its first major federal effort to educate parents about prescription drug abuse. The public awareness campaign began with ONDCP paying for advertising targeting parents during the Super Bowl this year.

More youth abuse prescription drugs than any other illicit drug, except marijuana; more than cocaine, heroin, and methamphetamine combined. Every day, 2,500 kids age 12-17 abuse a prescription painkiller for the first time and more people are getting addicted to prescription drugs. Drug treatment admissions for prescription painkillers increased more than 300% from 1995 to 2005.

Youth are abusing mainly 3 types of prescription drugs: painkillers (for use after surgeries or injuries), depressants (sleeping pills or anti-anxiety drugs), and stimulants (those drugs prescribed for attention deficit hyperactivity disorder). Serious health risks come with this abuse. A single large dose of prescription painkiller or depressants can cause breathing difficulty that can lead to death. Stimulant abuse can lead to hostility or paranoia, or the potential for heart system failure or fatal seizures. Prescription drug abuse is addictive.

Youth report abusing prescription drugs for the same reason as they take illegal drugs: to get high; to party; to experiment; to relieve boredom; to help them cope (manage stress, depression, or anxiety or help them relax); to deal with pressures (increase alertness or concentration to do better in school, control their weight); to self-medicate (relieve pain or sleep better). They abuse RX drugs because they believe it is not illegal, there is less shame attached to using them, there are fewer side effects than street drugs and because some parents "don't care as much if you get caught."

Friends and the family medicine cabinet are the major sources of these drugs. Some youth abuse their own prescriptions. Where to look?

- ◆ at home in the family bathroom where leftover drugs may be kept after an injury or surgery for a family member.
- ◆ from friends: their parents may not be aware of how to safeguard medicines.
- ◆ from relatives: grandparents may be another source, if they keep prescription drugs on hand for their illnesses.

What can parents do? Safeguard all drugs at home. Monitor quantities and control access. Know what you have and how much. If you have to refill medication more often than expected, you could have a problem. Be sure to properly conceal and dispose of old or unused medicines. Here are some suggestions for proper disposal of drugs: take unused, unneeded, or expired drugs out of their original containers and throw them in the trash; mix drugs with an undesirable substance such as used coffee grounds or kitty litter and put them in containers to throw in the trash; flush drugs down the toilet **ONLY** if the label specifically tells you to; use community pharmaceutical take-back programs that allow the public to bring unused drugs to a central location for proper disposal.
